EAA Chapter 534, September 26, Minutes (ZOOM monthly meeting)



Our September meeting was held via Zoom again this month. President Hargis called the meeting to order at 9:04. Approximately 20 members were present.

William McCarthy was recognized for having achieved his Private Pilot License. William talked briefly about his check ride. Jim Waymire noted that Rob Galloway, DPE, had noted doing the check ride was a pleasure.

Treasurer report-Mark Banus noted that there was significant outlay of funds this month, primarily due to paying for the last of the engine supplies for the C-150. But we are still whole. Laura Vaughn sent a check for the youth flight training fund. A suggestion was made to split it between Emily and Carson.

Activities-Paul Adrien-The speakers Paul has contacted want to do their presentations in person, so these are on hold for the time being. Jamie Beckett, AOPA Ambassador, would be willing to meet in person or via Zoom regarding the flying club.

There will be **NO Christmas Party** at the Adrien's this year.

Young Eagles-YE is still on hold at this time, until we see what developments will take place regarding social distancing and masks. Current requirements for those flying YE is that there is only 1 YE per plane. This would greatly reduce the numbers that we would be able to fly.

Youth Group-John Weber made a Zoom presentation about the Squadron 534 to the Villages Aviation Club last Monday. Jim Waymire noted that he might ask John to return to do an in-person presentation. Thank you to Joan and Ted Luebbers for their donation for flight training for Carson. Mention was made to send out an announcement about Carson to see if other members would like to donate as well.

Hangar report - Even with the Covid situation, there is still activity in the hangar. Murphy Rebel - Mark reported that the lower wing skin, doubler and leading edge have been completed on 1 wing. The fuel tank will be leak tested and then the upper skin can be attached and this wing will be finished. Aircamper - not much progress - some control surfaces need to be rib-stitched and then primed. The landing gear needs finish welding. Searey - Mike and Dale have been making slow but steady progress. Zenith 701 - the hot mag has been resolved. Jim Goodspeed got the antenna connector attached to the tray again. The fuel lines need to be replaced and the pitot/static system needs to be trouble-shot. Mark Banus has graciously offered for the Zenith to be temporarily put in his hangar.

New Business - the organization of the flying club topped the list. Stan Carpenter has been doing a lot of research into this. We have had several volunteers step up to become officers. President - Stan Carpenter, Vice-President - Frank McCutcheon, Treasurer - Gretchen Crecelius. Directors - Mike Smolen, Ted Mifflen, John Weber. A secretary is still needed. NOTE-the flying club will be a totally separate entity from the chapter, although our members and outside members may join. Altimeters! Safety comment by Editor

Before taxiing we listen to ATIS or AWOS to get the barometric pressure

to set in the kollsman window in inches of mercury. At small airports without AWOS we can check Air-nav or usually a sign is posted near the runup area citing the altitude of the airport. In Florida which has airports from sea level to a whopping 300 feet this may not a big deal. However, when flying into mountainous terrain the land appears to climb up to the plane in level flight. This is why on cross-country flights, we check ATIS at various waypoints along our trip to ensure proper clearance of terrain and obstacles. This is of course critical when landing at elevated airports to enter patterns as correct AGL pattern altitude. Even when you are on the ground for an extended period (lunch, flying YE) a front may move through changing with new pressures and winds.

As I am writing this, an NTSB report just showed up in General Aviation News regarding a pilot and passengers flying night VFR cross-country landing short of the runway in NM because he didn't reset his altimeter! He was showing 800 feet higher than he actually was and totaled the Cherokee landing in the dirt.

As John Weber, who has been flying aerobatics, will tell you. Aerobatic pilots set AGL at Zero on take-off as all maneuvers are based on AGL as the baseline.

This is not certain, but my first aerobatic instructor who sadly had more money than brains, became part of the runway at Waukegan airport in his first airshow, first lowlevel loop in front of his family. Did he set his altimeter properly? Never know. He never got a peer review for low-level aerobatics, so had may have had other compounding issues.




Illustration from "Roll around a point" textbook by Duane Cole
