Calculated Risk/Mitigated Risk

Every time we go flying it is a calculated risk. Have we checked the weather conditions? Have we checked the aircraft? Is it airworthy? Do we have the familiarity with the plane to fly it safely? Are we familiar with the airports we will be using? Am I in a safe physical/mental state to fly? Even if we check all the boxes to the best of our knowledge, we can still have emergency situations arise. **Sadly we lost a chapter member,** a very accomplished pilot, **Tony Yen** due to an engine failure last month.

I was asked by a friend of the family to help ferry Tony's Searey from Mid-Florida (X55) to Umatilla (X23). This was a whopping 6-mile flight. The first day that we had scheduled, we canceled due to weather. We set a "rain date" for Sunday, October 30th.

On the **negative side** of the equation were several factors:

- 1) Ideally, the plane would be moved before the end of the month.
- 2) Problem "Get-there-itis" and time constraints.
- 3) Another time constraint, as my flight review would run out on October 31, and I legally couldn't fly after that.
- 4) I have about 8 hours of Searey PIC, but it has been a couple years since I have flown one.
- 5) I thought I was going to be a right-seater trying to keep another pilot out of trouble. Nope, when we got there my friend said, "I will meet you back at Umatilla."
- 6) No written checklist in the plane.
- On the **positive side** of the equation were several factors as well:
- 1) It turned out to be a beautiful morning during the time we were to move the aircraft. The winds were light with only about a 6-knot crosswind.
- 2) I was very current in tail wheel aircraft as I had probably done about 20 landings in the last month.
- *3)* It had a Rotax engine which is a type I am familiar with and have flown with for many hours.
- 4) I have had training by Steve Wolf in the Pitts S-2B, where a written checklist wasn't used the CIGAR TIP acronym was used.
- 5) I wasn't even going to raise the gear, which is a standard practice among amphibian pilots. This was one less thing that could go wrong.
- 6) I was not going to be going over much of a populated area with many emergency landing sites available.
- 7) I was ready to cancel the flight if I felt there was ANYTHING I couldn't handle or could be a safety issue.
- 8) I knew the plane had been flying quite a bit in the previous month, so I didn't feel that there would be any problems due to inactivity.
- 9) I had the opportunity to do a thorough preflight without interruption.

Overall, I felt the positives outweighed the negatives, so I chose to do the flight. The flight went well, and the plane was ferried uneventfully and was even reusable!

Every flight that we make involves decisions that we make to reach the go/no go decision. Sometimes, when it comes to flying my own plane, perhaps I don't examine the aircraft quite as closely as I should. If we are just going to go around the pattern a few times, is there a tendency to not get a weather briefing and just look out the window? Paying attention to the details can sometimes make a big difference in making it a good day or a bad day.

Please think about your "preflight" details before your next flight.
