Takeoff distances have a sneaky way catching you off guard. Make sure you are proficient on your short field takeoff/landing techniques. That grass strip you fly off normally in the wintertime is now a borderline short field and I really don't care to be able to read the manufacturer's name on the safety balls strung on the power lines.

Lastly, remember to stay hydrated and have fun.

(Approx numberss for effect)

Effects of density altitude FL at C-172 @
65°F vs. 95°F @ Full Gross wt., on
pavement, no wind, with 10% flaps, Full
static RPM before release:

- **Gnd roll** 1,200 ft vs. 1,400 ft
- Rate of climb 685 fpm vs. 400 fpm
- Distance to clear 50ft trees –

1900 ft vs 2500 ft

If you are sloppy you might get in trouble!

Always check your POH for tables



More flaps = more drag Less density = less lift/less prop bite Less O2 = less engine performance
