Preflight Inspection

Do You LOOK or SEE What is there? John Weber- CFI-LS



When you or I do a preflight on our aircraft, do we look at it or do we really see what is there? Do we see what we expect to see? I think that all of us fall into this trap, particularly if the airplane is our own.

Look > *To direct one's gaze toward someone or something or in a specified direction.* (Oxford Languages) **See**-> *Perceive with the eyes; discern visually.* (Oxford Languages).

Though very similar, there is a distinct difference between the two. With looking, you don't have to perceive what is there.

Growing up, my father was a wildlife photographer and he used to do a presentation on "Don't Look, See what is there!" to Audubon and other nature organizations. I have a feeling that familiarity breeds contempt (to quote the old phrase) when it comes to pre-flighting our airplanes and we think we "see" when we are really just looking. This was brought home to me with the subtlety of a 2X4 on the last condition inspection of my Rans S-6. I "preflight" this airplane every time I fly it.



Guess what? I found one of my rudder cables was being cut in 2 by the fabric where it exited the fuselage. Had I been paying attention, I should have caught this earlier. This rudder cable normally has 7 strands and now only had 3 intact strands and these were worn. This could have turned into a very "bad" day.

Even though I have the repairman certificate on the S-6, I try to have another pair of eyes help me with the inspection. My friends have caught a worn wing attach bolt (found by lifting the wing at the rear attach point) and some worn aileron hinge bolts (again by applying an upward force on the aileron hinge). I have incorporated both of these practices on my



preflight inspections. I also feel that we have a tendency to expect to see certain things and our brains go with the assumption and don't really perceive when there is a problem.

Perhaps we might do a better preflight on a plane that we are renting/borrowing, as we don't have any preconceived notions on our inspection.

The question to ask yourself on your next preflight: Are you just "looking" or "seeing" your aircraft? This can also spill over to your "regular" life, are you **looking** at life or really **seeing** what is out there?

I invite you to really SEE what is there!

Putting Off Until Tomorrow

When it comes to the creation of a Last Will & Testament many Americans subscribe to the adage, "never do today what can be put off until tomorrow." Families often learn the hard way that Estate Planning should be a priority.

I cannot keep from wondering why so many fail to take advantage of all that a Will makes possible.

Too Busy Living To Think About Dying.

This may well be the single biggest reason so many Americans die without having prepared a valid Will. Daily living – from dawn to way past dark – is so demanding that it seems virtually impossible to think about anything even remotely related to death. The unfortunate truth is that the lives of children, spouses, and loved ones can often be made miserable because an individual failed to articulate important specifics in their Will or Trust.

Many people look at a modest home and a limited asset portfolio are too small to warrant the time and expense of a Will. This is often a costly assumption. Even after only a few short years, the value of a home -- even shares in a closely held, non-public entity – can increase so much that the tax and distribution implications are significant. Values can change quickly as a result of inflationary times. So, even in the case of young couples or estates that are seemingly very modest, a Will minimizes the effect of costs and taxes in the event of an untimely death These are just two examples of why so many may postpone the creation of a Will. But no matter what the reason, a little time and thought today can result in significant savings and unnecessary emotional stress later. In addition, the creation of a personal Will is the way you give final voice to your hopes, your dreams, and your values. It gives lasting voice to your legacy . . . a voice that will echo for generations.

I hope this gentle reminder prompts our members to assure that your estate plan documents are completed and are up to date.

Last, let me share an idea with you. Our EAA **Chapter 534** is certainly an organization with purpose and worthy of our support. May I suggest that you consider including EAA Chapter 534 in your estate plan. Did you know that the Ray Scholarships we offer are funded through an estate plan gift to the National EAA.
